CELEBRATE

Colac businessman and Rotary stalwart John Blane is Colac Otway Shire's 2017 Citizen of the Year.

Mr Blane has served the community through Rotary for almost 50 years and is also a respected and active member of the St Mary's Colac parish.

Mr Blane shared Australia Day honours with four other local people. **Johanna Noseda** from Apollo Bay received the **Young Citizen of the Year Award.** Johanna has just completed Year 12 and is considered to be a leader within her school community, as well as in sporting and community circles.

Frances Simm, who was instrumental in establishing Apollo Bay's Opportunity Shop in 1965, took out the **Community** Service Award. At 92 years of age, Frances still volunteers at the Opportunity Shop and has helped raise more than \$2 million for health services in Apollo Bay through her dedicated community work.

Colac's **Merrill O'Donnell's** contribution to the creative and cultural fabric of the community received acknowledgement in the form of the **Arts Service of the Year Award**.

A passionate historian, Merrill dedicates her time to capturing important local stories, recording local history and ensuring significant community milestones receive recognition.

The **Sporting Service of the Year Award** went to Colac's **Barry Cameron**, who is an inspirational role model for local sportspeople through his dedication, enthusiasm and commitment to many sports, and his willingness to take on positions with various clubs to advance sport in the community.

Mayor Chris Potter congratulated this year's award recipients and thanked them for the contributions they made to the community.

"Council was very pleased to acknowledge the generous spirit and community mindedness of our award recipients," he said.

"Our community is richer for the work these people do to help others and make a positive difference."

With Apollo Bay recently having been voted in Australia's top 10 beaches, it's no surprise that people would choose our part of the world to make a sea change.

For Markus Nolle and his family, it was almost as if the sea chose them.

After years of holidaying in Skenes Creek, Markus and his family got to thinking that Apollo Bay could be more than just a place for a weekend escape. A serendipitous 'for sale' sign positioned in the window of a boat named Neptune Warrior was the catalyst for a dream to become reality.

"It was a picture perfect scene," said Markus. "One weekend 10 years ago I was walking along the pier and noticed a cray boat with a sign offering the boat, license and quota for sale.

"I loved the 'Bay so much. This was my sliding doors moment and in my mind the decision was instantaneous."

Melbourne-born Markus, whose professional background is in IT, took no time convincing his family of his idea and they quickly settled in to a seafaring life.

"The sea is not only my friend; it's a way of life. I purchased the boat off a longtime fisherman, someone who had made a living from the sea. I employed his son with the boat as well, and he's still with me today."

Not only busy on the ocean, Markus is President of the Victorian Rock Lobster Association and Chairman of Seafood Industry Victoria. Markus has one of only 70 boats fishing for rock lobster in Victoria. Around the port of Apollo Bay boats travel as far as Cape Otway on a day trip or head towards the Twelve Apostles where they might anchor overnight.

While up to 90 per cent of crayfish caught off Apollo Bay are exported to China, Markus recommends making a trip to the Apollo Bay Fishermen's Cooperative to pick up a fresh rock lobster for yourself.

And the best way to cook it?

"Keep it simple! Boil for seven to 12 minutes (preferably in pristine seawater from our Great Southern Ocean), cool in iced water, place upside down in the fridge overnight to allow the meat to cure in the shell, and serve!"

HARBOURING SUCCESS

In addition to being a working port, the Apollo Bay harbour precinct is part of the fabric of the seaside town.

The harbour and surrounds support the local economy and are a popular drawcard for locals and visitors for a range of recreational pursuits.

Both Council and the community recognise the harbour's potential to become a significant tourism drawcard, and a strong partnership approach is in place to progress the community's visions for the harbour precinct.

An upcoming market testing exercise will enable the private sector to outline what might be achievable in the precinct within the current planning scheme controls.

Chief Executive Officer Sue Wilkinson said it was clear that public-private partnerships would be required to fund the level of infrastructure the community wanted at the harbour, such as an indoor pool.

"The market testing will provide us an understanding of the likelihood of private investment occurring in light of the commercial considerations and expected returns they would need to make to justify making an investment in the area," she said.

The project control group, which includes six Apollo Bay and district residents representing key community interest groups, discussed the market testing project at the end of January and will make a formal recommendation to Council on which consultant should lead the process.

Council will consider the control group's recommendation at its February 22 meeting at COPACC at 6pm.

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A GLORIOUS RACE ROUND THE GLOBE

HOLD onto your seats at COPACC for the original amazing race.

Around the World in 80 Days is a thrill-a-minute comedy which features stampeding elephants, raging typhoons, runaway trains, and is unabashedly slapstick.

HELLO, BEAUTIFUL!

BASED on her best-selling memoir Hello, Beautiful!, Hannie Rayson has created her own one-woman show - a work of comic storytelling.

Hello, Beautiful! is written and performed in the style of David Sedaris, Nora Ephron and Spalding Gray - true stories from a life, spiced with wit, social observation, and intimacy.

Hannie road-tested the content from Perth to Far North Queensland, during her 2015 book tour. From country town halls to woolsheds, to prisons and theatres, audience members said, 'you should do your own show'. So she did.

Hannie trained as an actor at the Victorian College of the Arts and although she has spent her working life as a playwright, she found herself wanting to bring together the writer and performer in her own show.

"In writing the memoir, I imagined my audience, the reader, tucked up in bed, laughing out loud. I wrote as though I were talking to a friend," Hannie said.

COMMUNITY FUNDING PROGRAM Opens SDDN

Got a bright idea for a community project? It's time to put pen to paper and share your idea.



Council's Community Funding Program has been the spark that's ignited hundreds of truly transformational projects in the Colac Otway Shire, such as the Boomerang Bags project in Apollo Bay.

Applications for the 2017 Community Funding Program open on 27 February across four categories - small equipment and training, recreation facilities, community projects and COPACC hire assistance.

Maybe your team's cricket nets need an upgrade, or perhaps your choir wants to put on a recital at COPACC – the projects are limited only to your imagination.

Apollo Bay's Boomerang Bags is among the most innovative projects to have received funding in recent years.

An initiative of the Otway Conservation Association, Council provided \$1500 to support volunteers to make reuseable bags from recycled materials.

Boomerang Bags are made available in Apollo Bay on a

'borrow and bring back' basis, and encourage the community to use a sustainable alternative to plastic bags, reducing the impact of pollution along our beautiful coast.

Otway Conservation Association's Shelly Forche-Baird said locals and visitors had embraced the Boomerang Bags concept with enthusiasm.

"People are saying that the bags are fantastic. They're happy to use them because it reduces plastic and keeps our beaches clean," she said.

"When we launched the project we did a lot of community engagement including some in-school education to get buy-in, and it has really paid off.

"It also demonstrates to our visitors that we care for our town and our environment. Recently I saw a bag from East Gippsland in circulation, which was a great feeling.

"People are returning and reusing the bags, which demonstrates that the system is sustainable."

Council's Arts and Leisure Manager Ian Seuren said Council recognised the immense value of play to the health and wellbeing of children.

"Play helps children develop their physical, social and cognitive skills, and also helps them to develop friendships and social connections with their peers," he said. "Time spent climbing, jumping and swinging also helps children build confidence and self-esteem.

"So while the kids think they're just having fun, they're unknowingly exercising and improving their motor skills, balance and coordination."

Council, in partnership with the State Government, recently opened two new playgrounds at Colac's Eastern Reserve and Western Bay park near Lake Colac. A third new playground, at Wyuna Estate in Elliminyt, also involved a financial contribution from the Scanlan family.

Ian said Council was currently working on a playground strategy to meet the needs of our growing community. He said Council believed it was important that the community was involved in the planning of playground upgrades and renewals.

"The most important input will of course be sought from the experts – children."

ALL TRAILS LEAD TO FORREST

So the saying goes, Australia rode to prosperity on the sheep's back... but it's a different kind of ride that's powering the new economy in Forrest.


Forrest is home to arguably the best mountain bike network in Australia, and these trails have helped transform what was once a timber town into a premier destination for nature and adventure-based experiences, outstanding local food and drink, and a diverse events calendar that will either warm the heart or get it racing, depending on your bent.

Resident of almost 30 years and secretary of the Forrest and District Community Group Mary Dracup said Forrest had always been a special place, and the mountain bike trails had only helped to enhance the Otways town.

"Forrest has always had its own natural advantages. We're enroute to Apollo Bay and in the foothills of the Otways, and it's always been a nice place for people to 'breathe out'.

"It has all the conveniences of a small town but it's still in the bush, the birds are lovely, we have the West Barwon reservoir for fishing and Lake Elizabeth for walking. We see koalas and wallabies almost every day, so Forrest is an accessible place to get those sorts of experiences."

The mountain bike trails, which attract thousands of people to



Forrest every year for competition rides and runs, have given the town the sort of exposure money can't buy.

Mary said the mountain bike trails were a medium for people to get to know the town better.

"Visitors are really quick to pick up on that sense of community because people in Forrest are on the level with them.

"People don't just run businesses in Forrest because they want to make money; they're here because they want to be."

Once an affordable place to buy a weekender, Forrest's real estate market has become more lucrative as visitors look to the town for a permanent tree change.

"The real estate market is a real indication that Forrest has become a desirable place to live," Mary said.

"Now we have fixed wireless broadband, that is going to open up even more opportunities for people wanting to base themselves and their businesses out of Forrest.

"We're a really diverse community with strong community groups and lots of voluntary activities and things going on."
